- 1. (U) Scope Note

(U) The Worldwide Threat to Shipping (WTS) message provides information on threats to merchant vessels, the shipping industry, and other maritime stakeholders worldwide in the last 30 days. This report is produced primarily to inform merchant mariners and naval forces.

2. (U) Warnings and Advisories:

1. (U) IMB/PRC/Alert – 180-2019. POSTED: 130600 UTC Nov 2019. TO: ALL SHIPS TRANSITING IN AND OFF EASTERN SABAH, MALAYSIA/CELEBES SEA/SULU SEA. This warning is a follow up warning broadcast transmitted since 280430 UTC Sep 2019 on alternate days. After re-evaluation by the Philippine and Malaysian Intel on 11 November 2019, this warning is still valid for another week and will be broadcast on alternate days until next re-evaluation on 18 November 2019. Currently the threat is still high as Abu Sayyaf Group (ASG) and spotters have now been spotted in Sitankai, Philippines, and may be preparing to conduct attack in the area of Semporna, eastern Sabah. Authorities have been notified. ASG plan kidnapping – original warning dated 280430 UTC Sep 2019. The IMB PRC has received information from Philippines and Malaysian intel that on 260300 LT Sep 2019, about 9 ASG members moved from Tawi Tawi islands and headed to Semporna waters area intend to carry out abduction. The target is foreign tourists at Mataking Island and Pom-Pom Island, Semporna. Seafarers/vessels are also at risk. The group is said to use 2 speed boats and armed with M-16, M-4 and M-40 weapons. The seriousness of this group is one of the factors of the abduction incident of fishermen at Tambisan Island recently. This warning will be re-evaluated again on 18 November 2019. Vessels are advised to remain vigilant and maintain strict anti-piracy watch and measures. Early assessment / detection will allow

ships to take evasive actions and other anti-piracy measures to prevent boarding and request for assistance. Citadel/safe room is important. All attacks and suspicious sightings should be reported to local authorities and to the IMB PRC as per IMO Cir 1334.

2. (U) MARAD Advisory 2019-012-Persian Gulf, Strait of Hormuz, Gulf of Oman, Arabian Sea, Red Sea-Threats to Commercial Vessels by Iran. Description: This revised advisory cancels U.S. Maritime Advisories 2019-004 and 2019-008. References: U.S. Maritime Alerts 2019-004A, 2019-003A, 2019-002A, and 2019-001A. Issue: Heightened military activity and increased political tensions in this region continue to pose serious threats to commercial vessels. Associated with these threats is a potential for miscalculation or misidentification that could lead to aggressive actions. Vessels operating in the Persian Gulf, Strait of Hormuz, and Gulf of Oman may also encounter GPS interference, bridge-to-bridge communications spoofing, and/or other communications jamming with little to no warning. 
3. (U) Summary

- 1. (U) MEXICO: On 11 November, eight armed men in two fast boats attacked the Italy-flagged offshore supply ship REMAS near Ciudad del Carmen.
- 2. (U) NIGERIA: On 11 November, up to ten armed men attacked a passenger boat transiting to Port Harcourt, kidnapping four immigration service officers.
- 3. (U) PANAMA: On 8 November, eight armed men boarded a yacht anchored in Bahia Nombre de Dios.
- 4. (U) MOROCCO: On 8 November, robbers boarded a berthed bulk carrier in Silos Terminal, Agadir.
- 5. (U) MARTINIQUE: On 7 November, robbers stole a 24-foot rigid hulled inflatable boat and outboard motor from the La Dunette dock in St. Anne.
- 6. (U) SAO TOME AND PRINCIPE: On 7 November, armed persons in a skiff approached and fired upon a tanker underway 57 NM north-northwest of Sao Tome Island.
- 7. (U) SINGAPORE STRAIT: On 5 November, six persons in two speed boats approached a tanker underway 3.6 NM southwest of Singapore.
- 8. (U) PANAMA: On 3 November, five Spanish-speaking men boarded a sailing yacht anchored in Bahia Nombre de Dios.
- 9. (U) SRI LANKA: On 3 November, navy forces boarded and seized a fishing boat found to be carrying 224 kilograms of heroin near Galle.
- 10. (U) INDONESIA: On 8 October, four robbers boarded a Saudi Arabia-flagged tanker anchored in Dumai Inner Anchorage.

4. (U) Details: Monthly Incidents by Region


(U) This section lists reports of active violence against shipping, credible threats to shipping, or the potential for a situation to develop into a direct threat to shipping over the past 30 days. Every effort is made to ensure that incidents are not double-counted. In the event double-counting is detected, or an incident is later found to be different than initially reported, an explanation of the cancellation of the inaccurate report will be made in at least one message prior to dropping the erroneous report.

A. (U) NORTH AMERICA:

- 1. (U) MEXICO: On 11 November, eight armed men in two fast boats attacked the Italy-flagged offshore supply ship REMAS near Ciudad del Carmen. During the boarding, two crewmen, both Italians, were wounded. Pirates ransacked the ship and fled. Injured seamen were transferred to a local hospital. REMAS moved to Ciudad del Carmen anchorage and anchored. (www.fleetmon.com)

(U) Figure 2. Central America - Caribbean - South America Piracy and Maritime Crime


- 1. (U) PANAMA: On 8 November, eight men armed boarded a yacht anchored in Bahia Nombre de Dios. They then restrained and robbed the five person crew and escaped. Three crew were able to remove the restraints, went to Linton Bay Marina, and made reports there to the police, coast guard, and port captain. Two women were taken to the hospital for evaluation. (www.safetyandsecuritynet.org)
- 2. (U) MARTINIQUE: On 7 November, robbers stole a 24-foot rigid hulled inflatable boat and outboard motor from the La Dunette dock in St. Anne. A search was made in the surrounding area and the boat was not located. The next morning, a police report was made. Later that morning, the boat was seen by others, nearby and aground in a place that had been well searched the previous night. (www.safetyandsecuritynet.org)
- 3. (U) PANAMA: On 3 November, five Spanish-speaking men boarded a sailing yacht anchored in Bahia Nombre de Dios. The two persons on board were taken by surprise and were slightly injured in the scuffle, but cooperated as the armed men ransacked the yacht and stole cash, communications devices, electronics and personal items. The yacht departed immediately for Linton Bay that night, where they made reports to the police, coast guard, and port captain. (www.safetyandsecuritynet.org)
- (U) PUERTO RICO: On 31 October, U.S. Customs and Border Protection personnel interdicted a vessel near Guayama. A search of the vessel revealed 1,902 kilograms of cocaine. Two men from the Dominican Republic were arrested. (www.cbp.gov)

- 5. (U) ST MARTIN: On 29 October, robbers stole an inoperable dinghy and 40-HP Honda outboard motor. The Gendarmes later recovered the dinghy/outboard (with only minor damage) which had been abandoned by the thieves. The Gendarmes returned the dingy to the owners. (www.safetyandsecuritynet.org)
- 6. (U) COSTA RICA: On 28 October, authorities seized one ton of cocaine concealed among a cargo of banana and lime concentrate inside a container at Moin Port. Authorities seized the narcotics after identifying a suspicious container during a routine inspection. The narcotics were bound for Antwerp Port in Belgium. (www.pviltd.com)
- 7. (U) ARUBA: On 13 October, authorities intercepted a small tug boat and during a search of the vessel, 2.2 tons of cocaine were found. The vessel was seized and the five Venezuelans onboard were arrested. (www.insightcrime.org)
- 8. (U) BRAZIL: On 13 October, authorities seized 1.3 tons of cocaine concealed among a cargo of sugar in a container at Paranagua Port. Authorities found the narcotics during a routine cargo inspection. The narcotics were bound for Rotterdam Port in the Netherlands. (www.pviltd.com)
- 9. (U) PERU: On 12 October, three robbers boarded a tanker anchored near position 11:59S 077:11W, Callao Anchorage. Alarm was raised and crew was mustered. Seeing the alerted crew, the robbers escaped in their boat. Further investigations indicated that the perpetrators opened the bosun storeroom skylight but were unable to steal anything. (IMB)
- 10. (U) HAITI: On 12 October, robbers armed with guns and long knives boarded an anchored vessel near position 18:33N 072:23W, Port Au Prince Anchorage. The robbers tied up a duty crewman. During the robbery, the ship's alarm was raised. The robbers escaped with stolen ship's properties. Incident reported to pilot station. (IMB)
- 11. (U) GUATEMALA: On 11 October, robbers boarded a sailing yacht anchored in Río Dulce Shell Bay. The robbers stole a dinghy and outboard motor from the yacht. (www.safetyandsecuritynet.org)



- (U) MEDITERRANEAN BLACK SEA:
 - 1. (U) LIBYA: On 27 October, two speedboats flying the flag of Libya fired shots at a German NGO rescue ship ALAN KURDI in international waters just outside Libya's territorial waters. The rescue ship received a report of migrants in distress. The NGO ship arrived on scene and found a large overloaded raft. ALAN KURDI's responders distributed lifejackets to the passengers and had begun to transfer them onboard when two white speedboats arrived. A crewman in one of the speedboats then fired a bow-mounted machine gun at the rescue ship. One Libyan boat took several of the migrants onboard, but these rescuees soon jumped off again, likely an indication of their reluctance to return to Libya. Despite the interference, ALAN KURDI's crew was able to rescue more than 90 people, and is heading toward Lampedusa, Italy. (www.maritime-executive.com)
 - 2. (U) LIBYA: On 21 October, Libya's Coast Guard intercepted 126 migrants off the coastal town of Garabulli. The migrants were all nationals of unspecified African countries. Libya remains a key departure point for migrants trying to reach Europe, although attempted crossings have decreased since 2017. (www.pviltd.com)

(U) Figure 3. West Africa Piracy and Maritime Crime




(U) Figure 4. West Africa Piracy and Maritime Crime

- 1. (U) NIGERIA: On 11 November, up to 10 armed men attacked a passenger boat transiting to Port Harcourt, kidnapping four immigration service officers. (www.punchng.com)
- 2. (U) MOROCCO: On 8 November, a duty officer onboard a bulk carrier berthed near position 30:25N 009:38W, Silos Terminal, saw four unauthorized persons onboard the vessel. Alarm was raised and crew was mustered. Seeing the alerted crew, the persons escaped. Nothing reported stolen. (IMB)
- 3. (U) SAO TOME AND PRINCIPE: On 7 November, armed persons in a skiff approached and fired upon a tanker underway near position 01:13N 006:09E, 57 NM north-northwest of Sao Tome Island. Alarm was raised, vessel increased speed and commenced evasive maneuvers. Fire pump activated, and four parachute rockets discharged. Due to the actions of the master and crew, the skiff aborted and moved away. Vessel and crew safe. (IMB; www.fleetmon.com)
- 4. (U) TOGO: On 4 November, pirates boarded the Greece-flagged tanker ELKA ARISTOTLE near position 05:58N 001:15E, 9 NM south of Lome. Pirates kidnapped two Filipinos, one Greek, and one Georgian. One security guard was also shot and wounded in the attack. (IMB; www.marinelink.com; www.gcaptain.com; www.fleetmon.com)
- 5. (U) BENIN: On 2 November, pirates boarded the Norway-flagged bulk carrier BONITA near position 06:14N 003:32E, 9 NM southeast of Cotonou. Nine crewmembers were kidnapped. (IMB; BBC; www.marinelink.com; www.gcaptain.com; www.fleetmon.com)
- 6. (U) NIGERIA: On 2 November, robbers attacked three passenger boats taking a group of people to a wedding in Degama Local Government Area of Rivers State. The robbers stole personal valuables and their boats, forcing the people to swim ashore. When a rescue boat was sent to retrieve the passengers, the robbers attacked it, killing two

people. When a second rescue boat subsequently arrived on the scene, the robbers fired upon it and sank it. (www.punchng.com)



1. (U) SRI LANKA: On 3 November, navy forces boarded and seized a fishing boat found to be carrying 224 kilograms of heroin near Galle. Seven persons were arrested. (www.adaderana.lk)

- 1. (U) SINGAPORE STRAIT: On 5 November, six persons in two speed boats approached a tanker underway near position 01:12.6N 103:34.3E, 3.6 NM southwest of Singapore. Duty crewman noticed persons attempting to board the tanker and raised the alarm. Master increased the speed and took evasive maneuvers resulting in the persons aborting the boarding attempt. (IMB)
- 2. (U) INDONESIA: On 8 October, four robbers boarded a Saudi Arabia-flagged tanker anchored near position 01:43N 101:26E, Dumai Inner Anchorage. Alarm was raised, crew was mustered and PA announcement made. The robbers escaped without stealing anything and a search carried out. Incident reported to local agent. (IMB; www.pviltd.com)
- 3. (U) VIETNAM: On 29 October, coast guard authorities announced the seizure of Mongolia-flagged tanker OKI MARU for suspected fuel smuggling. When apprehended, the ship was carrying a cargo of 350,000 liters of diesel fuel without the proper permits and transferring the fuel to an unidentified Vietnam-flagged vessel.
- 4. (U) INDONESIA: On 21 October, robbers boarded the Singapore-flagged cargo ship CSK ENTERPRISE near position 06:01N 105:53E, Cigading Anchorage. The robbers were sighted near the engine room entrance. The alarm was raised and crew was mustered. The robbers escaped without stealing anything. (www.arxmaritime.com)
- 5. (U) INDONESIA: On 20 October, a duty oiler on routine rounds onboard an underway bulk carrier was taken hostage by five robbers armed with a gun and knives near position 01:03N 103:38E. The robbers threatened the oiler and tied his hands. They then stole ship's spares and escaped. The oiler reported the incident to the OOW who raised the alarm and notified Singapore authorities. (IMB)

6. (U) INDONESIA: On 18 October, five robbers boarded the Greece-flagged tanker HIRADO near position 01:04N - 103:41E, 4.1 NM northeast of Pulau Cula. They were spotted in the engine room. Alarm was raised and the robbers escaped. The ship was searched and nothing was stolen. (www.arxmaritime.com)

J. (U) NORTHEAST ASIA:

1. (U) SOUTH KOREA: On 19 October, the Korea Coast Guard (KCG) announced that they had seized two 40-ton Chinese fishing boats in the West Sea with 400 kilograms of illegally caught cod, squid, and Korean cero. The crew members violently resisted the KCG's attempt to seize the vessels, throwing hand axes and shackles at the Korean officers. They face charges of obstruction of justice as well as violation of the Economic Zone Fishery Sovereignty of South Korea Act. (www.koreaherald.com)

(U) This appendix is provided to promote consistent use of accurate terms of reference in reporting and also identifies those references that were used to gather the information contained in this report. ONI welcomes comment and suggestions for addition or amendment.

(U) Terminology

- (U) In order to promote consistent use of accurate terms of reference, the following have been adopted to describe the range of criminal anti-shipping activity and impediments to safe navigation in our worldwide reporting and analysis. Please note that these terms relate to observable activity and are independent of target vessel status and exclude actions by governmental powers in lawful pursuit of their authorities:
- (U) The following terms have been adopted to describe the range of criminal anti-shipping activity and impediments to safe navigation in our worldwide reporting and analysis:

- (U) **Attempted Boarding** Close approach or hull-to-hull contact with report that boarding paraphernalia were employed or visible in the approaching boat.
- (U) Blocking Hampering safe navigation, docking, or undocking of a vessel as a means of protest.
- (U) **Boarding** Unauthorized embarkation of a vessel by persons not part of its complement without successfully taking control of the vessel.
- (U) Fired Upon Weapons discharged at or toward a vessel.
- (U) Hijacking Unauthorized seizure and retention of a vessel by persons not part of its complement.
- (U) Kidnapping Unauthorized forcible removal of persons belonging to the vessel from it.
- (U) Robbery Theft from a vessel or from persons aboard the vessel.
- (U) Suspicious Approach All other unexplained activity in close proximity by an unknown vessel.
