- 1. (U) Scope Note

(U) The Worldwide Threat to Shipping (WTS) message provides information on threats to merchant vessels, the shipping industry, and other maritime stakeholders worldwide in the last 30 days. This report is produced primarily to inform merchant mariners and naval forces.

2. (U) Warnings and Advisories:

1. (U) MARAD Advisory 2019-012-Persian Gulf, Strait of Hormuz, Gulf of Oman, Arabian Sea, Red Sea-Threats to Commercial Vessels by Iran. Description: This revised advisory cancels U.S. Maritime Advisories 2019-004 and 2019-008. References: U.S. Maritime Alerts 2019-004A, 2019-003A, 2019-002A, and 2019-001A. Issue: Heightened military activity and increased political tensions in this region continue to pose serious threats to commercial vessels. Associated with these threats is a potential for miscalculation or misidentification that could lead to aggressive actions. Vessels operating in the Persian Gulf, Strait of Hormuz, and Gulf of Oman may also encounter GPS interference, bridge-to-bridge communications spoofing, and/or other communications jamming with little to no warning. 3. (U) Summary


1. (U) PHILIPPINES: On 25 November, authorities in Manila announced the rescue of a UK citizen and his Filipino wife after they were kidnapped by Abu Sayyaf group fighters in the Philippines on 4 October.

- 2. (U) SPAIN: On 24 November, Spanish police intercepted a 22-meter long 'submarine' carrying 3,000 kilograms of cocaine on the country's northwest coast of Galicia.
- 3. (U) MALDIVES: On 22 November, one man was injured when he was repeatedly stabbed during an argument onboard a fishing boat.
- 4. (U) PHILIPPINES: On 22 November, authorities in the port of Cabangan in the province of Zambales, detained the Liberia-flagged bulk carrier DAYANG CENTURY. The ship was carrying a cargo of 57,000 tons of phosphogypsum, which was found to be slightly radioactive.
- 5. (U) MEXICO: On 21 November, authorities in the port of Altamira found 134 packages of cocaine hidden among a cargo of ore onboard the Bahamas-flagged bulk carrier DELPHI RANGER.
- 6. (U) GUATEMALA: On 15 November, robbers stole an 8-HP outboard motor from the secured dinghy onboard a sailing yacht anchored in Livingston.

4. (U) Details: Monthly Incidents by Region


(U) This section lists reports of active violence against shipping, credible threats to shipping, or the potential for a situation to develop into a direct threat to shipping over the past 30 days. Every effort is made to ensure that incidents are not double-counted. In the event double-counting is detected, or an incident is later found to be different than initially reported, an explanation of the cancellation of the inaccurate report will be made in at least one message prior to dropping the erroneous report.

A. (U) NORTH AMERICA:

- 1. (U) MEXICO: On 21 November, authorities in the port of Altamira found 134 packages of cocaine hidden among a cargo of ore onboard the Bahamas-flagged bulk carrier DELPHI RANGER. (www.fleetmon.com)
- 2. (U) MEXICO: On 11 November, eight armed men in two fast boats attacked the Italy-flagged offshore supply ship REMAS near Ciudad del Carmen. During the boarding, two crewmen, both Italians, were wounded. Pirates ransacked the ship and fled. Injured seamen were transferred to a local hospital. REMAS moved to Ciudad del Carmen anchorage and anchored. (www.fleetmon.com)
- B. (U) CENTRAL AMERICA CARIBBEAN SOUTH AMERICA:




(U) Figure 2. Central America - Caribbean - South America Piracy and Maritime Crime

- 1. (U) GUATEMALA: On 15 November, robbers stole an 8-HP outboard motor from the secured dinghy onboard a sailing yacht anchored in Livingston. (www.safetyandsecuritynet.org)
- 2. (U) BAHAMAS: On 14 November, 10 Haitian men armed with knives hijacked a Bahamas-flagged fishing boat south of Great Inagua. The Haitian men forced the three Bahamian crewmembers from the fishing vessel. The crewmembers had to swim several hours to make it ashore to report the incident. (www.bahamaspress.com)
- 3. (U) PANAMA: On 8 November, eight armed men boarded a yacht anchored in Bahia Nombre de Dios. They restrained and robbed the five person crew and escaped. Three crew were able to remove their restraints, went to Linton Bay Marina, and made reports there to the police, Coast Guard, and Port Captain. Two women were taken to the hospital for evaluation. (www.safetyandsecuritynet.org)
- 4. (U) MARTINIQUE: On 7 November, robbers stole a 24-foot rigid hulled inflatable boat and outboard motor from the La Dunette dock in St. Anne. A search was made in the surrounding area and the boat was not located. The next morning, a police report was made. Later that morning, the boat was seen by others nearby and aground in a place that had been well searched the previous night. (www.safetyandsecuritynet.org)
- 5. (U) PANAMA: On 3 November, five Spanish-speaking men boarded a sailing yacht anchored in Bahia Nombre de Dios. The two persons onboard were taken by surprise and were slightly injured in the scuffle, but cooperated as the armed men ransacked the yacht and stole cash, communications devices, electronics, and personal items. The yacht departed immediately for Linton Bay that night, where they made reports to the police, Coast Guard, and Port Captain. (www.safetyandsecuritynet.org)

- 6. (U) PUERTO RICO: On 31 October, U.S. Customs and Border Protection personnel interdicted a vessel near Guayama. A search of the vessel revealed 1,902 kilograms of cocaine. Two men from the Dominican Republic were arrested. (www.cbp.gov)
- 7. (U) ST MARTIN: On 29 October, robbers stole an inoperable dinghy and 40-HP Honda outboard motor. The Gendarmes later recovered the dinghy/outboard (with only minor damage) which had been abandoned by the thieves. The Gendarmes returned the dingy to the owners. (www.safetyandsecuritynet.org)
- 8. (U) COSTA RICA: On 28 October, authorities seized one ton of cocaine concealed among a cargo of banana and lime concentrate inside a container at Moin Port. Authorities seized the narcotics after identifying a suspicious container during a routine inspection. The narcotics were bound for Antwerp Port in Belgium. (www.pviltd.com)

C. (U) ATLANTIC OCEAN AREA:

1. (U) SPAIN: On 24 November, Spanish police intercepted a 22-meter long 'submarine' carrying 3,000 kilograms of cocaine on the country's northwest coast of Galicia. Police arrested two men from Ecuador, while a third escaped. (www.bloomberg.com; www.elpais.com)

D. (U) NORTHERN EUROPE - BALTIC:

(U) MEDITERRANEAN - BLACK SEA:


- 1. (U) GREECE: On 18 November, three crew of Panama-flagged general cargo ship ARMONIA were detained by Kavala port authority officials when they were found to be in possession of fake seaman certificates. The ship was detained for investigation. (www.fleetmon.com)
- 2. (U) ITALY: On 14 November, authorities in the Port of Gioia Tauro seized a ton of cocaine hidden in a cargo of bananas going to Germany. (www.ansa.it)
- 3. (U) LIBYA: On 27 October, two speedboats flying the flag of Libya fired shots at a German NGO rescue ship ALAN KURDI in international waters just outside Libya's territorial waters. The rescue ship received a report of migrants in distress. The NGO ship arrived on scene and found a large overloaded raft. ALAN KURDI's responders distributed lifejackets to the passengers and had begun to transfer them onboard when two white speedboats arrived. A crewman in one of the speedboats then fired a bow-mounted machine gun at the rescue ship. One Libyan boat took several of the migrants onboard, but these rescuees soon jumped off again, likely an indication of their reluctance to return to Libya. Despite the interference, ALAN KURDI's crew was able to rescue more than 90 people, and is heading toward Lampedusa, Italy. (www.maritime-executive.com)

F. (U) WEST AFRICA:

- 1. (U) EQUATORIAL GUINEA: On 20 November, pirates attacked the Singapore-flagged tug PACIFIC WARDEN near position 03:45N 008:14E, approximately 33 NM west of Malabo. The pirates have disembarked the ship. An Equatorial Guinea Navy ship is in the vicinity of the vessel. Investigations are ongoing. (IMB)
- 2. (U) NIGERIA: On 11 November, up to 10 armed men attacked a passenger boat transiting to Port Harcourt, kidnapping four immigration service officers. (www.punchng.com)
- 3. (U) MOROCCO: On 8 November, a duty officer onboard a bulk carrier berthed near position 30:25N 009:38W, Silos Terminal, saw four unauthorized persons onboard the vessel. Alarm was raised and crew was mustered. Seeing the alerted crew, the persons escaped. Nothing reported stolen. (IMB)
- 4. (U) SAO TOME AND PRINCIPE: On 7 November, armed persons in a skiff approached and fired upon a tanker underway near position 01:13N 006:09E, 57 NM north-northwest of Sao Tome Island. Alarm was raised, vessel increased speed, and commenced evasive maneuvers. Fire pump activated and four parachute rockets discharged. Due to the actions of the master and crew, the skiff aborted and moved away. Vessel and crew safe. (IMB; www.fleetmon.com)
- 5. (U) TOGO: On 4 November, pirates boarded the Greece-flagged tanker ELKA ARISTOTLE near position 05:58N 001:15E, 9 NM south of Lome. Pirates kidnapped two Filipinos, one Greek, and one Georgian. One security guard was also shot and wounded in the attack. (IMB; www.marinelink.com; www.gcaptain.com; www.fleetmon.com)
- 6. (U) BENIN: On 2 November, pirates boarded the Norway-flagged bulk carrier BONITA near position 06:14N 003:32E, 9 NM southeast of Cotonou. Nine crewmembers were kidnapped. (IMB; BBC; www.marinelink.com; www.gcaptain.com; www.fleetmon.com)
- 7. (U) NIGERIA: On 2 November, robbers attacked three passenger boats taking a group of people to a wedding in Degama Local Government Area of Rivers State. The robbers stole personal valuables and their boats, forcing the people to swim ashore. When a rescue boat was sent to retrieve the passengers, the robbers attacked it, killing two people. When a second rescue boat subsequently arrived on the scene, the robbers fired upon it and sank it. (www.punchng.com)




(U) Figure 4. Indian Ocean - East Africa - Red Sea Piracy and Maritime Crime

1. (U) MALDIVES: On 22 November, one man was injured when he was repeatedly stabbed during an argument onboard a fishing boat. Authorities stated that an argument broke out on a sea-cucumber fishing boat from Madduvari island in Raa atoll. (www.raajje.mv)

- 2. (U) MOZAMBIQUE: On 19 November, an alert duty crewman onboard a bulk carrier anchored near position 14:22S 040:42E, Nacala Outer Anchorage, noticed an unauthorized person on the forecastle deck and raised the alarm. Crew mustered and a search was carried out. Seeing the alerted crew, the person escaped. Nothing reported stolen. All crew safe. Incident reported to Port Control. (IMB)
- 3. (U) RED SEA: On 17 November, Saudi Arabia-flagged tug RABIGH 3 and another tug were seized by Houthi militia near position 15:25N 042:18E, 14 NM northwest of Kamaran Island, Yemen. The tug was taken to Al Qaryah, Yemeni waters, off Kamaran Island. A number of sources said the tugs were towing a South Korean dredge, which was also seized. Sixteen people, including two South Koreans, were on the three vessels. Press reporting indicates that the ships and crews were released on 20 November. - 4. (U) SRI LANKA: On 3 November, navy forces boarded and seized a fishing boat found to be carrying 224 kilograms of heroin near Galle. Seven persons were arrested. (www.adaderana.lk)

- 1. (U) PHILIPPINES: On 25 November, authorities in Manila announced the rescue of a UK citizen and his Filipino wife after they were kidnapped by Abu Sayyaf group fighters on 4 October. They are safe and unharmed. (www.thenational.ae)
- 2. (U) PHILIPPINES: On 22 November, authorities in the port of Cabangan in the province of Zambales, detained the Liberia-flagged bulk carrier DAYANG CENTURY. The ship was carrying a cargo of 57,000 tons of phosphogypsum,

- which was found to be slightly radioactive. The ship was detained and the crew arrested. The ship's papers did not reflect carrying a radioactive cargo. (www.fleetmon.com)
- 3. (U) SINGAPORE STRAIT: On 5 November, six persons in two speed boats approached a tanker underway near position 01:12.6N 103:34.3E, 3.6 NM southwest of Singapore. Duty crewman noticed persons attempting to board the tanker and raised the alarm. Master increased the speed and took evasive maneuvers resulting in the persons aborting the boarding attempt. (IMB)

K. (U) AUSTRALIA - NEW ZEALAND - PACIFIC OCEAN AREA:

1. (U) AUSTRALIA: On 3 November, Australia's Maritime Border Command ship CAPE JERVIS intercepted an Indonesian fishing ship operating two miles inside Australia's Exclusive Economic Zone northeast of Darwin, on Australia's northwest coast. Authorities searched the vessel and found a suspected illegal catch of 16 shark skins, 63 fresh shark fins and 60 kg of shark flesh. (www.fis.com)

(U) This appendix is provided to promote consistent use of accurate terms of reference in reporting and also identifies those references that were used to gather the information contained in this report. ONI welcomes comment and suggestions for addition or amendment.

(U) Terminology

(U) In order to promote consistent use of accurate terms of reference, the following have been adopted to describe the range of criminal anti-shipping activity and impediments to safe navigation in our worldwide reporting and analysis. Please note that these terms relate to observable activity and are independent of target vessel status and exclude actions by governmental powers in lawful pursuit of their authorities:

- (U) The following terms have been adopted to describe the range of criminal anti-shipping activity and impediments to safe navigation in our worldwide reporting and analysis:
 - (U) **Attempted Boarding** Close approach or hull-to-hull contact with report that boarding paraphernalia were employed or visible in the approaching boat.
 - (U) Blocking Hampering safe navigation, docking, or undocking of a vessel as a means of protest.
 - (U) Boarding Unauthorized embarkation of a vessel by persons not part of its complement without successfully taking control of the vessel.
 - (U) Fired Upon Weapons discharged at or toward a vessel.
 - (U) Hijacking Unauthorized seizure and retention of a vessel by persons not part of its complement.
 - (U) Kidnapping Unauthorized forcible removal of persons belonging to the vessel from it.
 - (U) Robbery Theft from a vessel or from persons aboard the vessel.
 - (U) Suspicious Approach All other unexplained activity in close proximity by an unknown vessel.
