(U) **WORLDWIDE: Worldwide Threat to Shipping (WTS) Report, 28 September – 26 October 2022**



26 October 2022

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1. (U) **Scope Note**

(U) The Worldwide Threat to Shipping (WTS) message provides information on threats to merchant vessels, the shipping industry, and other maritime stakeholders worldwide in the last 30 days. This report is produced primarily to inform merchant mariners and naval forces.

2. (U) Warnings, Advisories and Alerts: No warnings, advisories, or alerts issued this week. See Appendix C for active advisories.

3. (U) **Summary:**

A. (U) INDONESIA: On 23 October at 2359 local time, five robbers boarded the underway Marshall Islands-flagged bulk carrier GENCO ENDEAVOUR near Little Karimum Island in the eastbound lane of the Singapore Strait Traffic Separation Scheme (TSS).

B. (U) YEMEN: On 21 October at 1415 local time, the Marshall Islands-flagged crude oil tanker NISSOS KEA was attacked by two airborne drones while calling at the Ash Shihir oil terminal.

C. (U) PERU: On 14 October at 0130 local time, robbers boarded the anchored Brazil-flagged tanker JOSE DO PATROCINIO at Callao Anchorage.

4. (U) Monthly Incidents by Region

(U) This section lists reports of active violence against shipping, credible threats to shipping, or the potential for a situation to develop into a direct threat to shipping over the past 30 days. Every effort is made to ensure that incidents are not double-counted. In the event that double-counting is detected, or an incident is later found to be different than initially reported, an explanation of the cancellation of the inaccurate report will be made in at least one message prior to dropping the erroneous report.

A. (U) **NORTH AMERICA:** No current incidents to report.

B. (U) **CENTRAL AMERICA – CARIBBEAN – SOUTH AMERICA:**

1. (U) PERU: On 14 October at 0130 local time, robbers managed to board the anchored Brazil-flagged tanker JOSE DO PATROCINIO at Callao Anchorage, near position 11:58S – 077:12W. The duty crew onboard the vessel heard noises from the forward store space and raised the alarm, resulting in unauthorized persons escaping with ship's stores. The vessel reported the incident to port control and the harbor master. Port police boarded the tanker to investigate the theft. (IMB; Clearwater Dynamics; vesseltracker.com)

2. (U) SAINT LUCIA: On 6 October at 0030 local time, four robbers armed with knives and machetes boarded a yacht moored in the Soufriere Marine Management Area, near position 13:51N – 061:04W. The perpetrators stole electronics (a phone, a tablet, and a computer) and personal items (clothing). The crew were uninjured, and the incident was reported to the local police. (CSSN – Caribbean Safety and Security Net)

3. (U) PERU: On 29 September at 0015 local time, robbers boarded a berthed tanker near position 12:02S – 077:08W at Callao Port. The perpetrators stole ship's stores and escaped unnoticed. During routine rounds, the duty crew discovered evidence of a robbery. The vessel notified local authorities and port control of the incident. (IMB; Clearwater Dynamics)

C. (U) **ATLANTIC OCEAN AREA:** No current incidents to report.

D. (U) **NORTHERN EUROPE – BALTIC:** No current incidents to report.

E. (U) **MEDITERRANEAN – BLACK SEA:** No current incidents to report.

1. (U) YEMEN: On 21 October at 1415 local time, there were two drone explosions in close proximity to Marshall Islands-flagged crude oil tanker NISSOS KEA while calling at the Ash Shihir oil terminal near position 14:39N – 049:30E. Both explosions missed the tanker, which aborted loading operations and departed the area. The crew and vessel were reported safe and unharmed. (UKMTO; Clearwater Dynamics; Dryad Global)

1. (U) INDONESIA: On 23 October at 2359 local time, five robbers boarded the underway Marshall Islands-flagged bulk carrier GENCO ENDEAVOUR close to Little Karimung Island in the eastbound lane of the Singapore Strait Traffic Separation Scheme (TSS), near position 01:09N – 103:26E. The crew sighted the unauthorized personnel near the steering gear room and activated the ship's general alarm. Upon realizing they had been discovered, the robbers escaped empty-handed. The ship reported the incident to the Singapore Vessel Traffic System. The Singapore police coast guard later boarded the vessel for an investigation. Information was shared with Indonesian authorities. (IMB; ReCAAP; Clearwater Dynamics)

2. (U) INDONESIA: On 17 October at 0105 local time, three unauthorized persons boarded underway Malta-flagged bulk carrier MINOAN GRACE in the Phillip Channel, Singapore Strait near position 01:09N – 103:26E. Duty crew members spotted the robbers in the engine room and raised the alarm. After a search of the vessel, no perpetrators were located. The master declared nothing had been stolen and all crew were safe. The master reported the incident to Singapore Vessel Traffic Information System, notified the Republic of Singapore Navy and Singapore Police Coast Guard, and shared incident information with Indonesian authorities. (ReCAAP; Clearwater Dynamics)

3. (U) INDONESIA: On 16 October at 2230 local time, three unauthorized persons boarded an underway Panama-flagged bulk carrier HEILAN BRIGHT in the Phillip Channel, Singapore Strait near position 01:09N – 103:27E. Duty crew members sighted the robbers in the steering gear room and raised the alarm. Upon hearing the alarm, the perpetrators jumped overboard. The master declared nothing had been stolen and all crew were safe. The master

reported the incident to Singapore Vessel Traffic Information System, notified the Republic of Singapore Navy and Singapore Police Coast Guard, and shared incident information with Indonesian authorities. (ReCAAP; Clearwater Dynamics)

4. (U) INDONESIA: On 15 October at 0400 local time, a boarding occurred on an anchored bulk carrier at Panjang Anchorage, near position 05:28S – 105:18E. The perpetrators gained access to the vessel and escaped unnoticed with ship’s property. Duty crew members noticed the theft while conducting routine rounds, and reported the incident to the local agent. (Clearwater Dynamics)

J. (U) **INDIAN SUBCONTINENT:** No current incidents to report.


K. (U) **AUSTRALIA – NEW ZEALAND – PACIFIC OCEAN AREA:** No current incidents to report.

6. (U) **Appendix B: Definitions and Sourcing**

A. (U) **Definitions:** In order to promote consistent use of accurate terms of reference, we use the following definitions to describe a range of criminal antishipping activity and impediments to safe navigation in our worldwide reporting and analysis.

- (U) **Attempted Boarding** – Close approach or hull-to-hull contact with report that boarding paraphernalia were employed or visible in the approaching boat.
- (U) **Blocking** – Hampering safe navigation, docking, or undocking of a vessel as a means of protest.
- (U) **Boarding** – Unauthorized embarkation of a vessel by persons not part of its complement without successfully taking control of the vessel.
- (U) **Fired Upon** – Weapons discharged at or toward a vessel.
- (U) **Hijacking** – Unauthorized seizure and retention of a vessel by persons not part of its complement.
- (U) **Kidnapping** – Unauthorized forcible removal of persons belonging to the vessel from it.
- (U) **Hijacking/Kidnapping Combination** – Unauthorized seizure and retention of a vessel by persons not part of its complement who forcefully remove crewmembers from vessel when disembarking.
- (U) **Robbery** – Theft from a vessel or from persons aboard the vessel.
- (U) **Suspicious Approach** – All other unexplained activity in close proximity of an unknown vessel.

B. (U) Sourcing: ONI derives information in this report primarily from government agencies, piracy reporting centers, maritime security companies, and open press.
