1. (U) Scope Note

- (U) The Worldwide Threat to Shipping (WTS) report provides information on threats to merchant vessels, the shipping industry, and other maritime stakeholders worldwide in the last 30 days. This report is produced primarily to inform merchant mariners and naval forces.
- **2.** (U) **Warnings, Advisories and Alerts:** See Appendix C for active advisories.
- 3. (U) Summary:
- A. (U) THAILAND: On 10 May, three perpetrators boarded a fishing trawler at Sri Songkhla Dockyard.
- **B.** (U) INDONESIA: On 10 May, perpetrators in four small boats approached and boarded a barge under tow in the westbound lane of the Singapore Strait Traffic Separation Scheme.

4. (U) Monthly Incidents by Region

(U) This section lists reports of active violence against shipping, credible threats to shipping, or the potential for a situation to develop into a direct threat to shipping over the past 30 days. Every effort is made to ensure that incidents are not double-counted. In the event that double-counting is detected, or an incident is later found to be different than initially reported, an explanation of the cancellation of the inaccurate report will be made in at least one message prior to dropping the erroneous report.

A. (U) **NORTH AMERICA:** No current incidents to report.

B. (U) **CENTRAL AMERICA - CARIBBEAN - SOUTH AMERICA:**


- 1. (U) PERU: On 27 April at 0200 local time, robbers boarded an anchored container ship at Callao Anchorage, near position 12:00S 077:13W. They tied up two duty crewmembers and stole their personal belongings, and ship's stores. The alarm sounded, the crew mustered, and a search of the vessel was carried out. The ship informed port control of the incident and a patrol boat was dispatched to search the area. (IMB; Clearwater Dynamics)
- 2. (U) PANAMA: On 21 April at 2250 local time, unauthorized persons attempted to board the anchored Hong Kong-flagged container ship CSCL ZEEBRUGGE at Panama East Anchorage, near position 08:52N 079:29W. A duty crewman on routine rounds noticed perpetrators climbing the anchor chain via the hawse pipe. The alarm was raised and the crew mustered. Hearing the alerted crew, the perpetrators aborted the boarding attempt. The ship reported the incident to the Panama maritime authorities. (IMB; Clearwater Dynamics; vesseltracker.com)
- C. (U) ATLANTIC OCEAN AREA: No current incidents to report.
- D. (U) NORTHERN EUROPE BALTIC: No current incidents to report.
- **E.** (U) **MEDITERRANEAN BLACK SEA**: No current incidents to report.
- F. (U) WEST AFRICA GULF OF GUINEA:
- 1. (U) GABON: On 2 May at 0200 local time, perpetrators boarded the Marshall Islands-flagged bulk carrier GREBE BULKER anchored at Owendo Inner Anchorage, near position 00:16N 009:29E. The chief officer confirmed that three crew members had been kidnapped. The remaining crew members and vessel are reported safe. The tanker notified the local authorities of the kidnapping. (IMB; Clearwater Dynamics; vesseltracker.com)
- 2. (U) NIGERIA: On 28 April at 0500 local time, eight perpetrators armed with knives boarded the berthed Liberia-flagged cargo ship MSC WAVE F at Tin Can Island, Lagos, near position 06:25N 003:20E. After being spotted by crew members, the perpetrators escaped overboard to a waiting boat. Nothing was reported stolen and the crew was reported safe. (MDAT-GoG; Clearwater Dynamics; vesseltracker.com)
- 3. (U) ANGOLA: On 25 April at 0330 local time, robbers boarded the anchored Panama-flagged high-speed craft BOURBON SHAMAL in Luanda Anchorage, near position 08:47S 013:14E. The robbers stole an outboard engine from one of the fast support intervention vessels. Duty crew members spotted the robbers escaping in a small boat. The crew were reported as safe. (MDAT-GoG; Clearwater Dynamics; vesseltracker.com)
- 4. (U) ANGOLA: On 19 April at 0230 local time, one perpetrator boarded an anchored refrigerated cargo ship at Luanda Anchorage, near position 08:44S 013:18E. The duty watchman noticed an unauthorized person climb up the anchor chain and through the hawse pipe while another individual waited below on a small boat. The watchman raised the alarm and mustered the crew. Upon seeing the alerted crew, the perpetrator jumped into the water and escaped in the small boat. The master confirmed that all crew were safe and that nothing was reported stolen. (Clearwater Dynamics)

G. (U) ARABIAN GULF: No current incidents to report.

H. (U) INDIAN OCEAN - EAST AFRICA - RED SEA:

1. (U) RED SEA: On 19 April, the Russian-owned motor yacht 30 MINUTES lost contact with its owner while likely off the coast of Yemen. The vessel reportedly departed Jazan, Saudi Arabia en route to Djibouti with three Russian nationals and two Egyptians onboard. The owner stated that the yacht's skipper managed to send a distress call that the yacht was under attack by armed pirates. EUNAVFOR, UKMTO, and U.S. Fifth Fleet have all told press that they are investigating the case. UPDATE: Yacht 30 MINUTES and its five crew members safely reached Djibouti on 27 April after going missing for days following an attack off the Yemeni coast, the owner said. He stated the vessel reached Djibouti after being detained for several days by Eritrean authorities. (Maritime Executive; Associated Press; Reuters)

1. (U) THAILAND: On 10 May at 2200 local time, Thai Marine Police on patrol spotted one perpetrator onboard the anchored Thailand-flagged fishing trawler S KITTICHAI 1 at the Sri Songkhla Dockyard, near position 07:19N – 100:57E. The trawler was unmanned and awaiting overhaul. The police boarded the trawler and found two other perpetrators cutting and pulling sheet metal in the engine room. All three perpetrators were apprehended. (ReCAAP)

- 2. (U) INDONESIA: On 10 May at 0100 local time, a number of perpetrators boarded a barge under tow by the Singapore-flagged tug LANPAN 30 in the westbound lane of the Singapore Strait Traffic Separation Scheme (TSS), near position 01:01N 103:31E. Perpetrators boarded the barge from four small boats. The ship reported the incident to local authorities via VHF. All crew members were reported safe and nothing has been reported stolen. (IMB; Clearwater Dynamics; vesseltracker.com)
- 3. (U) PHILIPPINES: On 1 May at 0101 local time, two robbers boarded the anchored Panama-flagged container ship SOL STRIDE at Manila Bay Anchorage, near position 14:32N 120:55E. Duty crew spotted the perpetrators as they escaped by jumping into the sea. Crew members searched the vessel and discovered ship's properties and stores had been stolen. The ship reported the incident to the Philippines Coast Guard who dispatched a patrol vessel to investigate and monitor suspicious boat traffic in the area. All crew members were reported safe. (ReCAAP; Clearwater Dynamics; vesseltracker.com)
- 4. (U) INDONESIA: On 1 May at 0136 local time, four perpetrators boarded the underway Hong Kong-flagged product tanker RAINBOW STAR in the eastbound lane of the Singapore Strait TSS, near position 01:15N 104:13E. The ship sounded the alarm, which resulted in the perpetrators escaping empty-handed. All crew members were reported safe. The tanker did not require any assistance and continued its transit to the Philippines. (ReCAAP; Clearwater Dynamics; vesseltracker.com)
- 5. PHILIPPINES: On 27 April at 0345 local time, two robbers boarded the anchored Marshall Islands-flagged product tanker RIDGEBURY KATHERINE Z at Sangley Point Anchorage, Manila Bay, near position 14:33N 120:52E. The robbers stole ship's stores before escaping. The ship reported all crew safe. (ReCAAP; Clearwater Dynamics; vesseltracker.com)
- 6. (U) MALAYSIA: On 26 April at 2230 local time, four masked robbers armed with knives boarded an oil rig 0.7 NM northeast of Tanjung Langsat Harbor Jetty, near position 01:27N 104:01E. Authorities were notified that the robbers were stealing belongings from the two crewmen manning the platform and other rig equipment. A Malaysian Maritime Enforcement Agency patrol boat responded and apprehended the four robbers under the platform. The two crew members were reported safe but suffered minor injuries. The stolen rig equipment and personal belongings were recovered and returned. (Clearwater Dynamics)
- 7. (U) INDONESIA: On 22 April at 0930 local time, robbers boarded the barge ASIA PRIDE 2330 under tow by the Malaysia-flagged tugboat LION KIMTRANS TB 6 in the westbound lane of the Singapore Strait TSS, near position 01:16N 104:08E. The master reported to Singapore Vessel Traffic Information System that a sampan was alongside the barge and later observed that the vessel had departed and that scrap metal was missing. All crew members were accounted for and no assistance was needed. Information on the incident was shared with Indonesian and Malaysian authorities. (ReCAAP; Clearwater Dynamics)
- 8. (U) VIETNAM: On 19 April at 0030 local time, robbers boarded a container ship drifting at Ho Chi Minh Anchorage, near position 10:09N 107:09E. Robbers boarded the vessel and escaped with ship's stores without being detected. Duty crew members discovered the theft during routine rounds when they found that the paint locker padlock and ship's stores were missing. The ship reported the incident to port control; however, no response was received. (IMB; Clearwater Dynamics)

J. (U) INDIAN SUBCONTINENT:

1. (U) INDIA: On 25 April at 0130 local time, robbers boarded the anchored Liberia-flagged product tanker SOLAR ROMA at Kandla Anchorage, near position 22:45N – 070:00E. The duty crew subsequently noticed that ship's cargo equipment was missing. A check of CCTV footage revealed that five robbers had boarded the vessel. The ship informed port control of the incident. (IMB; Clearwater Dynamics; vesseltracker.com)

K. (U) AUSTRALIA - NEW ZEALAND - PACIFIC OCEAN AREA: No current incidents to report.

6. (U) Appendix B: Definitions and Sourcing

- **A.** (U) **Definitions:** In order to promote consistent use of accurate terms of reference, we use the following definitions to describe a range of criminal antishipping activity and impediments to safe navigation in our worldwide reporting and analysis.
 - (U) **Attempted Boarding** Close approach or hull-to-hull contact with report that boarding paraphernalia were employed or visible in the approaching boat.
 - (U) **Blocking** Hampering safe navigation, docking, or undocking of a vessel as a means of protest.

- (U) **Boarding** Unauthorized embarkation of a vessel by persons not part of its complement without successfully taking control of the vessel.
- (U) Fired Upon Weapons discharged at or toward a vessel.
- (U) **Hijacking** Unauthorized seizure and retention of a vessel by persons not part of its complement.
- (U) **Kidnapping** Unauthorized forcible removal of persons belonging to the vessel from it.
- (U) **Hijacking/Kidnapping Combination** Unauthorized seizure and retention of a vessel by persons not part of its complement who forcefully remove crew members from vessel when disembarking.
- (U) **Robbery** Theft from a vessel or from persons aboard the vessel.
- (U) Suspicious Approach All other unexplained activity in close proximity of an unknown vessel.
- **B.** (U) **Sourcing:** ONI derives information in this report primarily from government agencies, piracy reporting centers, maritime security companies, and open press.
