



(U) WORLDWIDE: Worldwide Threat to Shipping (WTS) Report 21 November - 24 December 2019



24 December 2019

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1. (U) Scope Note

1. (U) The Worldwide Threat to Shipping (WTS) message provides information on threats to merchant vessels, the shipping industry, and other maritime stakeholders worldwide in the last 30 days. This report is produced primarily to inform merchant mariners and naval forces.

2. (U) Warnings and Advisories:

A. (U) **MARAD Advisory 2019-014-Red Sea, Gulf of Aden, Arabian Sea, Gulf of Oman, and Indian Ocean-Violence Due to Regional Conflict and Piracy**. This revised advisory cancels U.S. Maritime Advisory 2019-007 References: U.S. Maritime Alerts 2018-001A, 2018-005A, 2018-007A, 2019-001A, and 2019-005A. Issues: Regional conflict and piracy threats continue to pose risks to commercial vessels operating in the above listed geographic areas. Conflict in Yemen continues to pose potential risk to U.S. flagged commercial vessels transiting the southern Red Sea, Bab al Mandeb Strait, and Gulf of Aden despite the current limited cease-fire between the Houthis and the Saudi Arabian-led Coalition. Threats may come from a variety of different sources including, but not limited to, missiles, rockets, projectiles, mines, small arms, unmanned aerial vehicles, unmanned surface vessels, or waterborne improvised explosive devices. These threat vectors continue to pose a direct or collateral risk to U.S. flagged commercial vessels operating in the region. Additionally, piracy poses a threat in the Gulf of Aden, Arabian Sea, Indian Ocean, and Gulf of Oman. B. (U) **IMB/PRC/Alert – 196-2019**: 180600 UTC DEC 2019 TO: ALL SHIPS TRANSITING IN AND OFF EASTERN SABAH, MALAYSIA/CELEBES SEA/SULU SEA/TAWI TAWI – WARNING. Sulu based Abu Sayyaf Group (ASG) planned a kidnapping for ransom (KFR) operation. After re-evaluation by Philippine intelligence on 16 December the warning is still valid for another week. Next evaluation will be on 23 December. Initially the IMB PRC received information from Philippines

Intelligence that on 9 Dec 2019, the Sulu based ASG - KFR group was monitored planning to conduct kidnapping activity in Sabah. The group primary target is kidnapping of foreign nationals in Sabah resorts, seafarers and vessels are also at risk. The group is preparing to go out to sea using one speedboat painted with grey and green color and powered by two 40-hp Yamaha engines. The group was seen purchasing fuel. Vessels are advised to remain vigilant and maintain strict anti-piracy watch and measures. The group may have already departed out to sea. Early assessment / detection will allow ships to take evasive actions and other anti-piracy measures to prevent boarding and request for assistance. Citadel/safe room is important. All attacks and suspicious sightings should be reported to local authorities and to the IMB PRC as per IMO Cir 1334. C. (U) **MARAD Advisory 2019-012-Persian Gulf, Strait of Hormuz, Gulf of Oman, Arabian Sea, Red Sea-Threats to Commercial Vessels.** Description: This revised advisory cancels U.S. Maritime Advisories 2019-004 and 2019-008. References: U.S. Maritime Alerts 2019-004A, 2019-003A, 2019-002A, and 2019-001A. Issue: Heightened military activity and increased political tensions in this region continue to pose serious threats to commercial vessels. Associated with these threats is a potential for miscalculation or mis- identification that could lead to aggressive actions. Vessels operating in the Persian Gulf, Strait of Hormuz, and Gulf of Oman may also encounter GPS interference, bridge-to-bridge communications spoofing, and/or other communications jamming with little to no warning. 3. (U) Summary:

A. (U) GULF OF GUINEA: On 24 December, pirates attacked the Malta-flagged tanker INSTANBUL 220 NM southwest of Bonny, Nigeria.

B. (U) GULF OF OMAN: On 23 December, Britain's Royal Navy announced the seizure of 131 kilograms of methamphetamines from a dhow in the northern Arabian Sea.

C. (U) INDONESIA: On 23 December, robbers boarded the Panama-flagged tanker BAMZI in the Singapore Strait.

D. (U) INDONESIA: On 23 December, robbers boarded the Panama-flagged bulk carrier TRUST STAR in the Singapore Strait.

E. (U) PHILIPPINES: On 22 December, Philippine Armed Forces rescued two Indonesian fishermen abducted from a Malaysian fishing boat in the waters off Lahad Datu in September.

F. (U) GABON: On 21 December, two merchant vessels reported a suspicious approach in Owendo Anchorage by a small boat with seven individuals.

G. (U) NIGERIA: On 21 December, pirates released 19 hostages from the Hong Kong-flagged tanker NAVE CONSTELLATION.

H. (U) GABON: Late on 21 December, seven armed men boarded two China-flagged fishing vessels, GUOJI 867 and GUOJI 838, near position 0019N - 00923E, Owendo Anchorage. The captain and chief engineer from both ships were kidnapped.

I. (U) GABON: Late on 21 December, a local landing craft was boarded by seven armed men near position 00:19N – 009:23E, Owendo Anchorage. The vessel captain was killed.

J. (U) GABON: Late on 21 December, the Liberia-flagged bulk carrier AFRICAN KALMIA was attacked in Owendo Anchorage.

K. (U) SRI LANKA: On 20 December, a crew member aboard the Turkey-flagged bulk carrier INCE KARADENIZ attacked the ship's Master with a knife, cutting his throat. The man later died.

L. (U) INDONESIA: On 20 December, robbers boarded the India-flagged tanker JAG LALIT in the Singapore Strait.

M. (U) INDONESIA: On 20 December, robbers boarded the Panama-flagged bulk carrier JIAN FA in the Singapore Strait.

N. (U) INDONESIA: On 20 December, robbers boarded the Bangladesh-flagged bulk carrier AKIJ GLOBE in the Singapore Strait.

O. (U) GULF OF GUINEA: On 19 December, a merchant vessel reported a possible mother ship towing a skiff approximately 150 NM southwest of Brass Nigeria.

P. (U) PHILIPPINES: On 16 December, the Philippines Coast Guard and other law enforcement authorities raided the Philippines-flagged RO-RO ship ANTONIA 1 in the port of Zamboanga and rescued 13 women.

Q. (U) MALAYSIA: On 12 December, Malaysian maritime forces seized Vietnamese oil tanker VIET TIN 01 after it was found adrift off the Malaysian coast. The tanker reportedly visited North Korea in February.

R. (U) INDONESIA: On 10 December, three robbers armed with long knives boarded an anchored bulk carrier in Panjang Anchorage.

4. (U) Details: Monthly Incidents by Region

(U) This section lists reports of active violence against shipping, credible threats to shipping, or the potential for a situation to develop into a direct threat to shipping over the last 30 days. Every effort is made to ensure that incidents are not double-counted. In the event double-counting is detected, or an incident is later found to be different than initially reported, an explanation of the cancellation of the inaccurate report will be made in at least one message prior to dropping the erroneous report.

A. (U) NORTH AMERICA: No current incidents to report.

1. (U) MEXICO: On 21 November, authorities in the Port of Altamira found 134 packages of cocaine hidden among a cargo of ore onboard the Bahamas-flagged bulk carrier DELPHI RANGER. (www.fleetmon.com)

B. (U) CENTRAL AMERICA - CARIBBEAN - SOUTH AMERICA:

1. (U) PERU: On 12 December, authorities announced the arrest of four suspects and the seizure of a submarine carrying two tons of cocaine near the border with Ecuador. (www.novinite.com).

2. (U) PERU: On 7 December, three robbers boarded, via the hawse pipe, an anchored bulk carrier anchored in Callao. The robbers tied up a duty crewman, took his radio, watch, and flashlight, and entered the forecastle storeroom. The duty crewman managed to escape and raise the alarm resulting in the crew mustering. Upon hearing the alarm, the robbers fled to a waiting motorboat. Upon investigation, ship's properties were reported stolen. Incident reported to port control. (IMB).

3. (U) BRAZIL: On 26 November, customs authorities in the Port of Santos seized 1,347 kilograms of cocaine hidden in a cargo of sugar going to Morocco. (www.moroccoworldnews.com).

4. (U) PERU: On 3 December, watchkeepers onboard Malta-flagged bulk carrier CANO near position 12:01S - 077:13E, Callao Anchorage observed movement on the forecastle and notified the duty officer. The duty officer observed two robbers stealing a mooring line. When the duty officer raised the alarm, the robbers fled. The incident was reported to VTS. (IMB).

5. (U) PERU: On 23 November, during routine rounds, a duty crewman aboard Panama-flagged vehicle carrier GALVESTON HIGHWAY, anchored near position 12:01S - 077:11W, Callao Anchorage, found the forecastle store room entrance door and a forward hatch cover open. Upon investigating, the crew discovered three mooring lines missing. Incident reported to Callao port authority. (IMB, www.arxmaritime.com).

6. (U) GUATEMALA: On 15 November, robbers stole an 8-HP outboard motor from the secured dinghy onboard a sailing yacht anchored in Livingston. (www.safetyandsecuritynet.org).

7. (U) BAHAMAS: On 14 November, 10 Haitian men armed with knives hijacked a Bahamas-flagged fishing boat south of Great Inagua. The Haitian men forced the three Bahamian crewmembers from the fishing vessel. The crewmembers had to swim several hours to make it ashore to report the incident. (www.bahamaspress.com).

C. (U) ATLANTIC OCEAN AREA:

1. (U) IRELAND: On 4 December, eight Albanian stowaways were discovered onboard a bulk cargo vessel arriving at Waterford's Container Port, Belview, from a port in France. (www.arxmaritime .com)

D. (U) NORTHERN EUROPE - BALTIC: (U) No current incidents to report.

E. (U) MEDITERRANEAN - BLACK SEA:

2. (U) ALGERIA: On 13 December, several persons attempted to board the Singapore-flagged LPG tanker NIKINSKY near position 36:45N - 003:04E, Port of Algiers. The vessel was undergoing cargo operations when the duty officer onboard the ship noticed three individuals attempting to board the vessel by using the forward mooring lines. When the ship alarm was activated, the individuals fled. The crew then conducted a stowaway search through the vessel and confirmed that there was no presence of any unauthorized individuals on board the ship. The incident was then reported to the local port authorities, who boarded the vessel in order to conduct their own investigation. (www.arxmaitime.com).

3. (U) GREECE: On 18 November, three crew of Panama-flagged general cargo ship ARMONIA were detained by Kavala port authority officials when they were found to be in possession of fake seaman certificates. The ship was detained for investigation. (www.fleetmon.com).

4. (U) ITALY: On 14 November, authorities in the Port of Gioia Tauro seized a ton of cocaine hidden in a cargo of bananas going to Germany. (www.ansa.it).

F. (U) WEST AFRICA:

1. (U) GULF OF GUINEA: On 24 December, pirates attacked the Malta-flagged tanker INSTANBUL near position 01:47N – 004:28E, approximately 220 NM southwest of Bonny, Nigeria. The pirates tried to board the tanker twice, but failed due to the crew's evasive actions. Following the unsuccessful boarding attempts, the pirates proceeded toward a possible nearby pirate mothership. (MDAT-GoG; IMB; www.fleetmon.com)

2. (U) GABON: On 21 December, two merchant vessels reported a suspicious approach by a small boat carrying seven persons near position 00:19N – 009:23E, Owendo Anchorage. (MDAT-GOG)

3. (U) NIGERIA: On 21 December, pirates released 19 hostages from the Hong Kong-flagged tanker NAVE CONSTELLATION. The men, 18 Indians and one Turk, were kidnapped on 3 December as the NAVE CONSTELLATION was transiting to India. (www.fleetmon.com)

4. (U) GABON: Late on 21 December, two China-flagged fishing vessels, GUOJI 867 and GUOJI 838, were boarded by seven armed men near position 00:19N – 009:23E, Owendo Anchorage. The captain and chief engineer from both vessels were kidnapped. (MDAT-GoG; www.fleetmon.com)

5. (U) GABON: Late on 21 December, a local landing craft was boarded by seven armed men near position 00:19N – 009:23E, Owendo Anchorage. The captain of the vessel was killed during the boarding. (MDAT-GoG; www.fleetmon.com)

6. (U) GABON: Late on 21 December, the Liberia-flagged bulk carrier AFRICAN KALMIA was attacked near position 00:19N – 009:23E, Owendo Anchorage. (MDAT-GoG; www.fleetmon.com)

7. (U) GULF OF GUINEA: On 19 December, a merchant vessel reported a possible mother ship towing a skiff near position 03:00N – 003:53E, 150 NM southwest of Brass Nigeria. (www.arxmaritime.com; www.sguardian.com)

8. (U) TOGO: On 15 December, six heavily armed pirates boarded the Marshall Islands-flagged product tanker DUKE underway near position 04:23.59N - 002:03.15E, 113 NM southeast of Lome, Togo. They kidnapped 20 of the 21 crew members and destroyed some equipment resulting in the tanker going into a blackout condition. The remaining crewman sent a distress signal and requested to be towed to a safe area. Upon receiving the information, the IMB Piracy Reporting Center liaised with regional authorities to provide assistance to the tanker. A Togo Navy ship was dispatched to the location of the tanker and made arrangements to tow the tanker. The 20 kidnapped crewmen were all Indian nationals. 9. (U) TOGO: On 12 December, authorities in Lome announced the release of three seafarers kidnapped on 4 November from the Greece-flagged tanker ELKA ARISTOTLE. The crewmen, one from the Philippines, one from Greece, and one from Georgia, were reportedly being checked at a local hospital before being released to go home. An additional crewman from the Philippines reportedly died during captivity from an illness. (www.safety4sea.com).

10. (U) NIGERIA: On 8 December, authorities announced the seizure of M/V TIM GBEGELE and 11 crewmen for illegally transporting 369 metric tons of diesel fuel. The ship was intercepted 77 NM southwest of Lagos. (www.thenationonlineng.net).

11. (U) NIGERIA: On 6 December, nine sailors from the Philippines who were kidnapped from Norway-flagged bulk carrier M/V BONITA on 2 November were released and are on their way home. (wwwsafety4sea.com).

12. (U) NIGERIA: On 3 December, pirates kidnapped 19 crew members (18 Indian and 1 Turkish) from the Hong Kongflagged very large crude carrier NAVE CONSTELLATION approximately 77 NM south of Bonny Offshore Terminal. (www.newindianexpress.com).

13. (U) GUINEA: On 21 November, five robbers boarded a merchant vessel anchored near position 09:31N - 013:43W, Conakry Anchorage. Local authorities opened an investigation into the event. (www.arxmaritime.com).

G. (U) ARABIAN GULF: (U) No current incidents to report.

H. (U) INDIAN OCEAN - EAST AFRICA - RED SEA:

1. (U) GULF OF OMAN: On 23 December, Britain's Royal Navy reported the seizure of 131 kilograms of methamphetamines from a dhow in the northern Arabian Sea. The drugs were found during a routine search. (www.marinelink.com)

2. (U) SRI LANKA: On 20 December, a crewmember aboard the Turkey-flagged bulk carrier INCE KARADENIZ attacked the ship's Master with a knife, cutting his throat. The man later died. Two other crewmen who tried to intervene were wounded. The ship contacted Sri Lanka authorities and changed course, heading for Colombo. The Turkish Consulate was also informed. (www.fleetmon.com)

3. (U) RED SEA: On 3 December, a merchant vessel reported a suspicious approach by one skiff near position 12:32N – 04326E, Bab el Mandeb Strait. (UKMTO).

4. (U) MALDIVES: On 22 November, one man was injured when he was repeatedly stabbed during an argument onboard a fishing boat. Authorities stated that an argument broke out on a sea cucumber fishing boat from Madduvari Island in Raa atoll. (www.raajje.mv).

I. (U) EAST ASIA - SOUTHEAST ASIA - INDIAN SUBCONTINENT:

1. (U) INDONESIA: On 23 December, Panama-flagged tanker, BAMZI was underway in the Singapore Strait and en route from Nipa anchorage, Indonesia to Qing Dao, China when the chief engineer and duty engineer spotted three robbers in the engine room. One of the robbers was armed with a knife. When the alarm was raised, the robbers fled. Two motormen were later found who had been tied up by the robbers. A subsequent search found nothing was stolen and the ship resumed her voyage. (ReCAAP; www.fleetmon.com)

2. (U) INDONESIA: On 23 December, Panama-flagged bulk carrier TRUST STAR was underway in the Singapore Strait when the crew spotted six robbers onboard. When the crew raised the alarm, the six robbers fled. The robbers had tied up two crewmembers in the engine room, who later managed to untie themselves. The master subsequently altered course for the port of Singapore in case there were more robbers onboard. Singapore Police Coast Guard boarded the ship and conducted a search on and found no robbers. Nothing was stolen during the boarding. (ReCAAP: www.fleetmon.com

3. (U) PHILIPPINES: On 22 December, Philippine armed forces rescued two Indonesian fishermen abducted from a Malaysian fishing boat in the waters off Lahad Datu in September. Authorities are attempting to rescue the third fisherman being held hostage.

4. (U) INDONESIA: On 20 December, an unknown number of robbers boarded the Panama-flagged bulk carrier JIAN FA while underway in the Singapore Strait bound for China. A subsequent search revealed nothing was stolen during the boarding. The vessel informed Singapore VTIS of the incident and continued her voyage. (www.fleetmon.com)

5. (U) INDONESIA: On 20 December, six robbers armed with knives boarded the India-flagged tanker JAG LALIT while underway in the Singapore Strait bound for Kaoshiung, Taiwan. During the boarding, the 4th Engineer was punched in the face and the chief engineer sustained bruises on the neck. Upon the ship's arrival in Singapore, the Singapore Police Coast Guard boarded the ships for investigation and verified that the crew was safe. (www.fleetmon.com)

6. (U) INDONESIA: On 20 December, the crew of the Bangladesh-flagged bulk carrier AKIJ GLOBE spotted five robbers in the engine room while underway in the Singapore Strait. When the crew raised the alarm, the robbers fled in a boat with stolen engine and generator spares in a boat. The Singapore Police Coast Guard boarded the ship upon arrival at Singapore anchorage. (www.fleetmon.com)

7. (U) PHILIPPINES: On 16 December, Philippines Coast Guard and other law enforcement authorities raided the Philippines-flagged RO-RO ship ANTONIA 1 in the port of Zamboanga. Authorities rescued 13 women likely being trafficked abroad. The ship was scheduled to sail to Sabah, Malaysia. (www.maritimebulletin.net)

8. (U) MALAYSIA: On 12 December, Malaysian maritime forces seized Vietnamese oil tanker VIET TIN 01 after it was found adrift off the Malaysian coast. The tanker reportedly visited North Korea in February. The Malaysian Maritime Enforcement Agency said a team of officers boarded the tanker after it was found anchored without authorization just off the southern Malaysian state of Johor. (www.pviltd.com)

9. (U) INDONESIA: On 10 December, three robbers armed with long knives boarded an anchored bulk carrier near position 05:30S - 105:17E, Panjang Anchorage. They broke into the engine room workshop, stole auxiliary engine spares and escaped. Authorities notified. (IMB)

10. (U) INDONESIA: On 14 December, police arrested two men after discovering an illegal cargo of smuggled animals in the Port of Dumai. During a search, they found four lion cubs, a leopard cub, and a box containing 58 turtles. (www.home.bt.com).

11. (U) INDONESIA: On 6 December, robbers attempted to board the Singapore-flagged tug, BW LOYALTY near position 011N -10356E, near Batam Island. The vessel was underway when a suspicious boat with seven individuals approached it from the side. One of the robbers attempted to secure a rope at the ship's port side, but failed due to the adverse weather conditions. The duty officer onboard the vessel sounded the general alarm and the boat departed the area. (www.arxmaritime.com).

12. (U) MALAYSIA: On 5 December, the Panama-flagged tanker SILVANA III was spotted by Malaysian Maritime Enforcement Agency (MMEA) forces as the tanker was illegally anchored in Kuala Kuaru waters, south of Penang Island, Malaysia. When an MMEA patrol boat approached the ship with the intention of boarding, the ladder wasn't lowered and tanker left the anchorage, in violation of Malaysian regulations and laws. (www.fleetmon.com).

13. (U) PHILIPPINES: On 1 December, robbers boarded and robbed the anchored Malta-flagged container ship CMA CGM NEW JERSEY, near position 14:32N - 120:52E, within Manila Anchorage via the anchor cable and hawse pipe. The robbers broke the lock to Bosun stores and stole ship's property. The incident was reported to port authorities. (IMB).

14. (U) PHILIPPINES: On 30 November, two robbers boarded the anchored Marshall Islands-flagged tanker RIO DAYTONA via the hawse pipe, near 13:43N - 121:02E, in Alpha Anchorage, Tabangao, Batangas, Phillippines. When the duty officer raised the alarm, the robbers fled. (IMB).

15. (U) INDONESIA: On 29 November, four robbers, one armed with a 50-cm knife, boarded the underway Hong Kongflagged bulk carrier CHINA PIONEER, near position 01:16N - 104:13E, 7.6 NM northwest of Paluau Tanjung Bntung Besar, Indonesia. When the crew activated the ship's alarm and deck lighting, the robbers fled. A subsequent investigation by the crew revealed nothing was stolen. (IMB).

16. (U) SINGAPORE: On 27 November, robbers armed with knives boarded the Marshall Islands-flagged bulk carrier KMAX EVDOKIA near position 01:18N - 104:20E, 7 NM southeast of Sungai Rengit. The robbers fled after the crew raised the alarm. The crew conducted a full search, nothing was stolen, and the vessel and crew are safe. (www.arxmaritime.com)

17. (U) INDONESIA: On 24 November, two robbers boarded a barge loaded with containers being towed by Malaysiaflagged tug HARBOUR LIBRA, near position 01:14N - 104:04E, 2.2 NM northwest of Pulau Nongsa, Indonesia, in the eastbound lane of the Traffic Separation Scheme (TSS) of the Singapore Strait. The robbers fled after the crew raised the alarm. Some twist locks and ropes had been stolen during the attack. (www.arxmaritime.com)

18 (U) PHILIPPINES: On 25 November, authorities in Manila announced the rescue of a UK citizen and his Filipino wife after they were kidnapped by Abu Sayyaf group fighters on 4 October. They are safe and unharmed. (www.thenational.ae)

19. (U) MALAYSIA: On 24 November, five robbers armed with long knives boarded the Marshall Islands-flagged bulk carrier FAYE near position 01:16N - 104:14E, 2.2 NM northwest of Pulau Nongsa, Indonesia, in the eastbound lane of the Traffic Separation Scheme (TSS) of the Singapore Strait. When the crew noticed the robbers entering the ship's engine room, they raised the alarm which resulted in the robbers fleeing. (www.pviltd.com; www.arxmaritime.com)

20. (U) PHILIPPINES: On 22 November, authorities in the Port of Cabangan in the province of Zambales, detained the Liberia-flagged bulk carrier DAYANG CENTURY. The ship was carrying a cargo of 57,000 tons of phosphogypsum, which was found to be slightly radioactive. The ship was detained and the crew arrested. The ship's papers did not reflect the carriage of radioactive cargo. (www.fleetmon.com)two

J. (U) NORTHEAST ASIA:

1. (U) JAPAN: On 11 December authorities arrested 11 suspects attempting to smuggle 600 kilograms of methamphetamines into the country by boat off Kumamoto Prefecture, in southern Japan. (www.taiwannews.com)

2. (U) CHINA: On 29 November, authorities seized 540 tons of illegally imported frozen meat in Hong Kong. Authorities seized the meat from a suspicious fishing vessel which was bound for mainland China. Six individuals were arrested at the scene. (www.pviltd.com)

K. (U) AUSTRALIA - NEW ZEALAND - PACIFIC OCEAN AREA: No current incidents to report.

7. (U) Appendix B: Terminology and References

(U) This appendix is provided to promote consistent use of accurate terms of reference in reporting and also identifies those references that were used to gather the information contained in this report. ONI welcomes comment and suggestions for addition or amendment.

(U) Terminology

(U) In order to promote consistent use of accurate terms of reference, the following have been adopted to describe the range of criminal anti-shipping activity and impediments to safe navigation in our worldwide reporting and analysis. Please note that these terms relate to observable activity and are independent of target vessel status and exclude actions by governmental powers in lawful pursuit of their authorities:

(U) Attempted Boarding – Close approach or hull-to-hull contact with report that boarding paraphernalia were employed or visible in the approaching boat.

(U) Blocking – Hampering safe navigation, docking, or undocking of a vessel as a means of protest.

(U) Boarding – Unauthorized embarkation of a vessel by persons not part of its complement without successfully taking control of the vessel.

(U) Fired Upon - Weapons discharged at or toward a vessel.

(U) Hijacking – Unauthorized seizure and retention of a vessel by persons not part of its complement.

(U) Kidnapping - Unauthorized forcible removal of persons belonging to the vessel from it.

(U) Robbery – Theft from a vessel or from persons aboard the vessel.

(U) Suspicious Approach – All other unexplained activity in close proximity of an unknown vessel.
